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


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

Overview

Welcome to the Kansas City Art Institute (KCAI), where the spirit of exploration, curiosity and passion defines our educational journey. From a humble home-based Sketch Club, we became the Kansas City Art Association and School of Design in 1885, the Fine Arts Institute in 1907, and renamed ourselves Kansas City Art Institute in 1920. Expanding through various locations, including the Deardorff Building and Vanderslice Mansion, KCAI now thrives as a private institution on a 16-acre campus, providing immersive studio experiences across 13 majors.

With a faculty of 120+ working artists, we are dedicated to shaping passionate students into visionary creators, creative problem solvers, and global citizens. Nestled between the Nelson-Atkins Museum of Art and the Kemper Museum of Contemporary Art, our campus is a “studio between two showrooms,” where impactful ideas evolve into acclaimed works. This is KCAI – where creativity meets education, and every story is a masterpiece in the making.





KCAI History & Highlights

Explore Kansas City Art Institute's (KCAI's) riveting history, tracing its evolution from covert beginnings to a present characterized by creativity and innovation.

Sketch Club Roots

In 1885, KCAI sprang to life as the Sketch Club, an underground society of artists that gathered in private homes. After its inaugural exhibition in 1887 the Sketch Club gained support from 12 benefactors, and later found a permanent home in the illustrious Deardorff Building at 11th and Main Street in downtown Kansas City.

The Vanderslice Gift

The iconic Vanderslice Mansion was built in the late 1800s as the home of August R. Meyer, the first President of the Kansas City Park Board. He used the house as a primary residence and commonly referred to it as "Marburg". The mansion remained occupied until 1927 when the house and land was purchased by a local business man named Howard Vanderslice and donated to the Kansas City Art Institute. The primary function of the building was to house classrooms and studios, and later served as an administrative building for the college. An auditorium was added in 1930, designed by local architecture firm Wight and Wight. A neighborhood homes tour was established in the early 1980s as a fundraiser to support refurbishing Vanderslice Hall and undoing mid-century modernizations. These renovations were made possible by generous benefactors, donations, and community contributions. Vanderslice Hall was added to the National Register of Historic Places in 1982.

A Studio Between Two Showrooms

In 1933, the Nelson-Atkins Museum of Art became KCAI's neighbor to the east. Then, in 1992, the Kemper Museum of Contemporary Art joined the neighborhood just west of campus. KCAI sits between the two renowned museums, acting as a bridge between contemporary trends and timeless classics.

Mineral Hall

An historic architectural marvel in its own right, KCAI's Mineral Hall has affectionately been dubbed the "Hobbit House" by students. Constructed in 1903 and acquired by KCAI in 1968, this building, an example of a Prairie School Architecture, boasts a unique blend of styles. Originally a residence, it now functions as administrative offices and an artistic foundation of KCAI. Its distinctive door is famously one of the most photographed doorways in Kansas City.

The Emily & Todd Voth Artspace

Since 1999, the Emily & Todd Voth Artspace (formerly H&R Block Artspace) has championed emerging and established contemporary artists through exhibitions, public programming, and educational initiatives.

As an integral part of KCAI, the Emily & Todd Voth Artspace is a bridge that connects campus and the wider Kansas City community, promoting engagement with contemporary art and fostering future generations of artists and creative professionals. The Artspace is also home to KCAI's permanent collection of fine art.

The KCAI Gallery

Launched in 2016 in the Crossroads District and relocated to the Tony Jones Studios on the main campus, the KCAI Gallery serves the mission of KCAI through collaborative, curriculum-based engagements with students, faculty, community and artists in residence.

A Transformational Gift

In 2015, KCAI received an incredible, anonymous gift of \$25 million. This generous donation has had a lasting impact on the institution, influencing its future in terms of funds, space, and scholarships. Today, with 13 majors and a faculty of 120+ artists, KCAI stands as a clear example of how a substantial gift can empower students, equipping them with the tools and resources to bring their artistic visions to life.



Student Enrollment



- **Whitney Manney ('12 Fiber):** Fashion and textile designer transforming the aesthetics of street art and urban cultural movements into wearable artwork.


