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(1) Course Title: ARTIST AS TRAVELER

Length: 4 weeks

Dates: 6/19/25 - 7/21/25

Credit Hours: 3

Meeting Times: 2-5pm Monday - Friday, plus an additional 5, 6-hour courses scheduled outside of this stated meeting time for cultural engagements and field trips. Additional Open Studio

times will be communicated as needs arise.

## **Course Description**

This course addresses immersion into a new cultural context as a springboard for creative practice. The multifaceted curriculum engages the world as a classroom while students learn about regional culture and work with local community partners. This coursework includes an excursion to the Cañada de la Virgen archeological ruins and a retreat to a biodynamic regenerative agriculture initiative that brings together organic cattle ranching with the stewardship of agave. We will discuss a spectrum of regional ethnic dynamics from the Pre-Columbian era to the colonialist past and touristic present. Students will be enrolled in Spanish language classes at the Instituto Allende. From this foundation, the students will produce diaristic work, choosing media that they feel is most appropriate, such as text, photo, video, sculpture and/or drawing, to personally investigate their experience of cultural immersion. Students may also choose to incorporate materials or methodologies they are learning in their Cultural Engagement Through Materials coursework.

- Cultural sensitivity and engagement through art practice
- Build personal ethics of engaging another cultural context
- New understanding of material practices from the San Miguel de Allende region
- Expanded understanding of social practice

Due to the compressed nature of this course, students are encouraged to keep a planner for deadlines that pertain to their individual workshop and project schedule. Planning, preparation, and communication is key.

#### **Methods of Assessment**

Students will have one-on-one meetings with the instructors during class times, as well as critique opportunities. Classes, assignments, deadlines, and class material presented by the instructors from the Instituto Allende count toward your overall final grade in the course.

Students are expected to be present and actively working during class time. Individual check —ins will happen on a regular basis. Students are expected to spend significant time outside of class hours on their studio work, any communal studio tasks that may need to be accomplished (prepping material or checking in on materials and tools), field trips, etc. Communal studio tasks may be scheduled outside of "normal class hours" due to the compressed timeline and intensive nature of this course.

All finished artworks for either course MUST be photographed and uploaded to student's individual shared Google drive folders. These are the same folders where you uploaded your passport, insurance and flight information.

## **Project Briefs**

There are four main engagements as part of Artist as Traveler:

- Spanish Language Classes
- Day trips, local excursions and other group/class cultural experiences and conversations pertaining to the course descriptions
- Engagements with the community
- Individual Studio Work and participation in the final exhibition.

# Spanish Language Classes:

Your Spanish instructors will be taking attendance. Absences and tardies will impact your grade. We encourage you to use what you learn here around town, in our engagements with the community, and with one another!

## Day Trips and other Cultural Experiences:

We have a variety of day trips and cultural experiences lined up for you. Your engagement in these trips and attention to meeting times, places, and being appropriately prepared is essential (i.e. sunscreen, water, and appropriate walking shoes; a notebook/sketchbook for note taking and reflections for every class period; etc). If you have questions regarding how to prepare for any of our class times or trips, please let us know.

San Miguel de Allende is a high altitude city. The tap water is not appropriate for drinking, so bottled/filtered water is critical. UV rays are more intense at high altitudes even though it may not feel hot. We encourage you to take care of your health and wellness so that you can fully engage in the curriculum and experiences offered.

Reflections and group conversations will often follow or be integrated into our day trips and experiences - come prepared with something to write with and a notebook/sketchbook.

## Community Engagements:

We will be working with the public. Your utmost professionalism is expected at all times. We encourage you all to wear appropriate clothing to class for this reason (we may get messy, we may be running around - you never know!). In general, cell phone use should be limited to research only. No sharing photographs or names of the community members or fellow students on social media without consent.

Non-participation due to unprofessional behavior or failure to follow protocol can negatively impact a student's grade.

These engagements are a great opportunity for you to use your Spanish Language skills, what you have learned in your Summer Studio Intensive course, and to bring your skills and creativity to the community. Students are expected to be hands-on during these class periods. Works from this portion of the course (may be collaborative works or partner-projects) will be included in the final exhibition.

### Individual Studio Projects

We expect students to be working toward an individual studio project. These works will be included in the final exhibition. Project proposals will be due the second week of the course via a 20 minute meeting with Jarrett and Casey. The schedule for the meetings is as follows:

Week three will be critical for making work for the exhibition. The timelines are tight. We expect all students to be on time and ready to work for all class periods. There will be some in-class time for working on these projects, however, students are expected to work outside of class time (for example, during open studio time).

## Attendance

Students are expected to be on time and ready to work for all class periods, day trips and mandatory engagements, including exhibition set up.

Students who arrive late, leave early, miss class, or otherwise are not fully participating will be marked as absent. Absences will impact student's final grades. Students who miss 10% of any class should expect a reduced grade. Students who miss 15% of any class may fail the course.

We ask that any students who are ill or believe that they may be late or absent notify us ASAP. This will allow for coursework and planned activities to move forward and help us get you caught up when you are well and able to return to class.

## Additional Trip Health and Safety Policies and Information

 Tap water in San Miguel is not potable. Fresh fruits and vegetables should be washed/soaked in BacDyn / Microdyn or another food grade disinfectant to avoid illness.
 Only drink bottled or filtered water and use your best judgment when purchasing food.

- Students are asked to always use the buddy system. Do not go places alone and do not go "home" with others. We encourage you to make friends, but to keep your friendships and adventures in safe, public spaces. If it feels risky, it probably is. Don't do it.
- When traveling outside of town, taking hired or public transportation, or after dark, please travel in groups of three. Make sure you have a working and charged phone.
- Curfew is 1 am. Students are expected to be at the hotel by this time (set an alarm for 12:30 or 12:45 if you are someone who likes to be out late). 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Course Title: CULTURAL ENGAGEMENT THROUGH MATERIAL

Length: 4 weeks

Dates: 6/19/25 - 7/21/25

Credit Hours: 3

Meeting Times: 9am - 12pm Monday - Friday, plus an additional 5, 6-hour courses scheduled outside of this stated meeting time for cultural engagements and field trips. Open studio hours

are 5-8 pm Monday - Friday and Saturday 9-1. Additional Open Studio times will be

## **Course Description**

This course considers the use of material processes found in the San Miguel de Allende region and teaches students to employ these methods. Students will have options of studio classes they can enroll in at the Instituto Allende, specifically a ceramics workshop using locally harvested clay or a fiber workshop focusing on naturally dyed wool and weaving. Students will work collaboratively during the retreat to Cañada de la Virgin to learn about and build an adobe structure on site. Students will produce self directed studio works while inevitably drawing from their immersion in the local environment and culture.

If someone is unaccounted for by curfew, we ask that another student in the group check in with that person (i.e. knock politely on their hotel room door) and send a message to the group chat. If there is still no contact made and someone is missing or something has happened, we need to know ASAP. Please honor and respect this safety measure.
